3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

Awareness rallies on Literacy, Water Conservation, Tree Planting, Plastic Eradication, Health Camps and Blood Donation Drives have helped students play their part in transforming the community.

'Lessons in Reuse' were practiced by students who converted discarded pet bottles into bricks using the technology adopted by 'Samarpan Foundation' an NGO involved in eco restoration projects. Tangled– a **Flagship** program of the Rotaract on 'Hair donation for the underprivileged Cancer patients' was held on **February 4th, 2014**.

The Yi organized a **fundraising basketball tournament titled "Game Changers"** for **corporate teams** from the IT industry, on **13**th **March 2014 at the Corporation Ground, Nungambakkam.** Six teams from five IT Companies participated in this one-day tournament. The teams participated enthusiastically and CTS was declared the winner after the team beat Wipro in the finals. The winners received a cash prize of Rs. 10,000/-. Rs. 1,38,000/- was raised from this event and was distributed as scholarships for needy students of the College.

The Village Adoption Project of WCC has been designed to support and empower rural communities and break their cycle of poverty with the support of the Institute of Sustainable Development. A non-descript village in Thirukandalam Panchayat with predominant bonded labourers belonging to the Irula Tribe has been chosen by WCC for adoption.

VIKAAS – STUDENT COUNSELLING CENTRE

A Project of the Department of Psychology

Report of Activities: June 2013 - April 2013

The activities of Vikaas for the academic year June 2013 – March 2014 started with a presentation on the activities and mission of Vikaas by the student counsellor Manisha Ninan to the first year students during the orientation program conducted for the first year students on 25th June, 2013.

Introductory sessions on the activities of Vikaas were conducted for 45 minutes to first year students of 9 departments of the aided section – Departments of Computer Science, Physics, Chemistry, Plant Biology and Biotechnology, Advanced Zoology and Biotechnology, History, Home Science, Mathematics and English respectively. Programs were conducted for both Undergraduate and Post graduate first year students. The same was conducted to 11 departments of the self-financed section – Post graduate Departments of Human Resource Management, Computer Science, Information Technology, Chemistry, Biotechnology, Communication, and Undergraduate Departments of BCA, B. Com., BBA, B.A Corp and B.Sc. Visual Communication respectively.

WORKSHOPS

A 'Trust Walk' exercise was conducted for 16 2nd year students on 12th July, 2013 by Ms Manisha Ninan. This outdoor exercise was conducted in order to help students understand the importance of communication and trust in relationships.

A workshop-orientation program was conducted for all hostel students on adjusting to hostel life and relationships in the hostel environment on $23^{\rm rd}$ July, 2013. The session was conducted by Ms Manisha Ninan and Ms Zarina A.

A demonstration of the Jacobson's Progressive Muscle Relaxation Exercise was conducted by the counsellor for 46 III year Psychology students on 30th July, 2013. The counsellor demonstrated the Relaxation exercise on a student and followed it by allowing a student to administer the exercise on a volunteering classmate, under supervision.

A workshop on Understanding Your Self-Esteem by the counsellor was conducted for 23 students of the III Advanced Zoology and Biotechnology Department, as part of the course Enhancing Personality on 31st July, 2013.

Workshops were conducted for the Actors of the Annual College Play (5+15 Actors). The workshops were to enhance team-building, improvisation skills and understanding emotions. A total of 4 workshops were conducted by Ms Manisha Ninan on the following dates:

- 1. 22nd August, 2013
- 2. 23rd August, 2013
- 3. 2nd September, 2013
- 4. 6th September, 2013

The methodology used in the workshop was primarily that of Playback Theatre, a form of therapy which involves the creative execution of theatrical games, appropriate for the target group. It was substantiated with debriefing sessions and discussions to help the group of actors understand and become comfortable in the acting arena.

A workshop was conducted for 29 III year students on Time Management on 24th August, 2013. The workshop included an original game, on the lines of a treasure hunt, constructed by the Counsellor in order to help understand organization skills.

The counsellor Ms Manisha Ninan assisted in making arrangements for the Senate Retreat conducted on 29th August, 2013. It was conducted for the full strength Student Senate. The focus of the retreat was chosen to be Leadership skills with a spiritual angle. Padma T.S. of Cry India, former Senate member of Women's Christian College conducted the workshop.

A workshop was conducted for the I M.Sc. Psychology Applied Psychology students 16 in number by Ms Manisha Ninan on 30th August, 2013. The workshop was titled 'How to get bya little help from friends' It was based on a stress management module and also dealt with

coping with transition into post graduate program from undergraduate programs. The module included time management techniques, Relationship building exercises, How to utilize resources, Optimism, using a sense of humour, creativity, tips on presenting seminars and organizing projects and also taking care of health. The workshop was highly interactive and experiential and included video presentations and a number of games and activities which helped highlight points within the topics.

A workshop was conducted on Stress Management for 26 II Postgraduate students FSM, FSN as part of their paper Life Skills for Personal Growth on 3rd September, 2013. The workshop was an interactive session which helped the students identify their own stressors and learned to cope with them.

The counsellor Ms Manisha Ninan helped coordinate a workshop on Family Therapy given by Dr Sivakami of the Centre for Family Therapy on 17th September, 2013 for the II PG Counselling and Psychotherapy students (11).

A workshop was conducted on Conflict Resolution for 26 II Postgraduate students FSM, FSN as part of their paper Life Skills for Personal Growth on 21st October, 2013. The workshop elucidated steps in win-win conflict resolution through videos and interactive discussions and also covered situations in which conflicts cannot be resolved.

A workshop was conducted on January 17th, 2014 on the topic of "Understanding your feelings" for 26 students of the Enhancing Personality class. The students were taught about deriving meaning out of cues in verbal and non behaviour of a person and themselves. They were given time to also practice noting down these signs and explain feelings.

On 18th February, 2014 the counsellor, Manisha Ninan conducted a workshop for 30 III year English Department students as part of their Theatre class on communication and teamwork. The medium used to teach was playback theatre, a form of therapy using theatre exercises.

Love Yourself: Program on Self Esteem

Vikaas along with the I M.Sc. Psychology class organized a four-day program based on self-esteem.

18th February, 2014: The students of the I M.Sc. class put up a street play in common areas of the college, which elucidated the differences between high self-esteem and low self-esteem by enacting a scene about college students. The students also used a flash mob to catch the attention of the students. Flyers were distributed about the upcoming events that were planned.

<u>19th February, 2014:</u> On this day, the students had a rally where they held charts and walked around college encouraging the students to "Love Yourself"

<u>20th February, 2014:</u> The movie 'Soul Surfer' was screened for the college students. The movie is an American biopic drama film, released in 2011. The movie is a film adaptation of the autobiography *Soul Surfer: A true story of Faith, Family, and Fighting to get back on the board.*

It follows the inspiring true story of Bethany Hamilton, an aspiring surfer who lost her arm after a horrific shark attack. A discussion followed the movie, elaborating, and dealing with low self-esteem. 20 students attended the movie screening.

<u>24th February, 2014:</u> A workshop was conducted on this day to conclude the events of the week. Here Self-Esteem was dealt with more in detail. The causes of low self-esteem, strategies to overcome low self-esteem, counselling in the context of self-esteem are few of the topics handled during the workshop. The workshop was conducted by both the students of the I M.Sc. class and also the counsellor, Manisha Ninan. It was filled with a lot of activities, where the audience could not only learn more about self-esteem but also evaluate their own standing on the issue.

INDIVIDUAL COUNSELLING

Individual counselling was given to 24 students from aided and self-financed section for a range of 1-20 sessions each. Counselling was given for personal problems, career guidance and study skills.
