- Eye donation awareness program was organized by the NSS unit of WCC on 18th February 2015. 5.6 Details of student counselling and career guidance

VIKAAS – STUDENT COUNSELLING CENTRE

A Project of the Department of Psychology

Vikaas, the Sanskrit equivalent for "Overall development" is the Student Counselling Centre of WCC. The unit was started in 1985 as a Project of the Department of Psychology with a mission to provide professional counselling services in a confidential setting for the psychological, emotional, and social wellbeing of students as they pursue academic goals and explore personal growth. The counselling services at Vikaas are aimed at enabling students to lead a fulfilling, fruitful and responsible life and to be effective contributing members of the society.

Objectives of Vikaas

The goal of Vikaas is to provide students with holistic development through academic, career and personal counselling and is achieved through the following objectives:

- Help students identify and attain their educational and career goals,
- Promote personal growth and social development of students,
- Guide students in becoming active, responsible and self-disciplined citizens,
- Encourage and assist students in making informed personal and professional choices.

Activities of Vikaas

Orientation Programs

The first years of UG and PG courses from the aided and self-financed streams are given an orientation program about the counselling services of Vikaas. The counsellor meets with the respective departments of aided and self-financed streams of the college to conduct the induction program. Students are encouraged to visit the centre and make use of the services provided at Vikaas. They are given a brief overview about the various activities of Vikaas.

Individual Counselling:

Psychological Counselling is offered to individual students relating to issues on concentration, time management, study habits, shyness, insecurity, self-confidence, exam fear, communication skills, interpersonal relationships, family, career and health. The counsellor spends 4-8 sessions with each student and each counselling session is held for 40 minutes.

Workshops on Life Skills:

Workshops on Life Skills are held once every month for students with the aim to equip students with the necessary knowledge, skills and values to enhance their life skills in order to develop a comprehensive personality. The workshops are purposed and designed to be interactive, participative and inclusive.

• GIA GSSC (Global Shared Service Centre) GOAL Program offered by SCOPE

This is a one year program organized in collaboration with **SCOPE and Thozami (NGO)** is aimed towards offering free training for academically proficient but underprivileged students of WCC and also women students from other city colleges. The inauguration of the event was held at Hyatt Regency, Teynampet, Chennai on 10th December 2014.

The program is offered to the present II year students. **17 WCC students** (4 Physics, 6 Mathematics and 7 computer science) and **25-30 students of other colleges** attended. The orientation for the students was held on 26th February 2015 at WCC.

The representatives from SCOPE elaborated on the details of the course to the students. The dignitaries were Mr. PCR Suresh, Ms. Sharon, Ms. Preetha and other HR executives of SCOPE and Ms. Lily Margaret, representative of Thozhamai. The program commenced on **11**th **March 2015** and will continue till the end of next semester.

Note: The program is offered to students of Shift I only since arrangement of training sessions in the forenoon was not possible by SCOPE.

ON-CAMPUS RECRUTMENTS

The on-campus recruitment began as early as **September 2014**. Besides the regular corporate firms a number of new organizations were contacted and placements were organized by the Placement Coordinators. **397 students** were offered jobs in various companies ranging from Banks, IT, ITES, KPOs to Educational institutions. They have been recruited in various job profiles in different levels of the management.

Every placement included the following procedures:

- Pre-placement talk about the organization (45-60 min)
- Aptitude test (online or written) (45-120 min each batch)
- Group discussion (15 min for each group)
- Telephonic interview (15 min per student)
- Technical interview (15-20 min per student)
- HR interview (15-20 min per student)

The selected students were provided with provisional offer letters subject to the completion of their course at WCC.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The Curriculum is constantly revised and upgraded with the help of experts. Need based papers are introduced to keep the students abreast of the latest developments in their field.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Infrastructure is upgraded to provide Smart Classrooms, OHP's etc. to enhance the Teaching-Learning Process. ICT learning is emphasized. Lectures by experts in the field, Industry visits, Field trips, OJT's, Internships, Learner Designed Courses, Group discussions and conducting Conferences in emerging fields are some of the innovations adopted.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Examination

- 1. Photographs of candidates were incorporated in the Hall Tickets
- 2. Scrutiny of Question Papers by External Experts was done.
- 3. Course Completion Certificate was issued to all the final year students who completed the course
- 4. Ruled answer booklets were issued for the End Semester Examination which helped the students minimize wastage of paper.
- 5. Single valuation of answer scripts was adopted during revaluation of answer scripts which eased the procedure of consolidation of marks.

Evaluation

Double evaluation system is followed. The marks awarded by the internal & external examiners are totalled by the staff of the examination office before consolidation of marks to avoid totalling errors.

Cross checking of the entry of marks and totalling have been introduced.

6.3.4 Research and Development

Major and Minor projects are conducted through funding from UGC, UBCHEA. There are two Major and eight Minor ongoing projects.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Books, Magazines, DVD's and both Print and Online Journals are bought to upgrade the collection. Need based infrastructure revisions are made constantly.
