1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution?

Feedback Obtained

Students: Feedback is received from students at the end of each semester through a structured online course and teacher evaluation form to assess the course of study and the performance of individual faculty member. Course Evaluation feedback is utilized to revise curriculum, design new courses and also to adopt new approaches to teaching-learning. Gaps in the teaching-learning environment are addressed during new faculty orientation and need based FDPs. Student representations on the Boards of Studies and Academic Council also give feedback. Peer Review of lesson plans for each course has helped teachers to revise their teaching methodologies and assessment practices. Recent developments in the field, industry expectations and challenges faced during the teachings of the courses form the basis for curriculum revision. **Feedback from Parents:** Each year the parents are requested to complete a feedback form on the aspect of curriculum/degree program to gain an insight on how we can improve on various parameters. Some of the parameters accommodated in the parent's feedback, include assessing the programme for preparing the students for placements and higher studies and on aspects like rules, regulations, facilities on campus etc. The feedback analysed provides an insight that needs changes/amendments on the above mentioned areas. **Alumna:** Feedback from recent alumna is obtained from returning graduates through a structured online feedback questionnaire. The feedback obtained is collated and analysed that has enabled strengthen the infrastructure and also provide value additions of the degree program. This has helped to enhance employability skills of our students while also developing civic responsibility. **Industry Experts:** The view and suggestions from the Industry experts in the Board of Studies, IQAC and academic council are considered for further recommendation for changes/modifications in the curriculum or syllabus and also for introducing value-added courses to cater to the needs of the Industry society that increase employability skills and entrepreneurships. **Feedback of students on Quality Circles:** Hygiene of the food outlets, cost and sale of junk foods, maintaining hygiene in campus and reset rooms are the primary problems discussed. The students are permitted to raise concerns pertaining to infrastructure and the QC suggests good practices and solutions for maintaining the infrastructure and facilities on campus.

The Advisor-Advisee system is a unique practice of the college that has been successfully practiced for several decades wherein every student is assigned a faculty mentor to facilitate her holistic development. A faculty mentor is assigned to groups of students to counsel and guide them on curricular, co-curricular and personal matters. The mentors monitor the academic performance of the students, and offer suggestions for improvement. They also record regularity of students, their participation in curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities, disciplinary issues if any and also recommend students for management scholarships, leadership roles, representation in committees etc. The Advisor and Advisee meetings are held at least twice per semester and also whenever any issue arises and the mentor's invention is needed to resolve the issue. This practice has received positive feedback from past students who felt faculty mentoring helped students utilize the facilities and programs on campus better to excel in both academic and non-academic fields and also facilitated holistic development.

WCC has well established procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing the various facilities and infrastructure on campus. The Building Committee, the Purchase Committee, and the Working Committee constituted by the college management consist of experts who meet periodically to review the need and decisions are taken with respect to the repair and maintenance of infrastructure facilities and services. Human Resource Officer and Maintenance Manager appointed by the College is in overall charge of the maintenance of buildings, Classrooms and laboratories. The Lab assistants and support staff in every department take care of the regular maintenance of laboratories and Classrooms. The general guidelines/procedures, safety precautions to be undertaken, laboratory emergency response procedures and instructions for the students to adhere to during lab sessions are displayed in all the science laboratories. System Technicians are responsible for maintaining the computers, peripherals and accessories in the computer labs, departments and administrative offices of the college. Classrooms, Auditoriums, Seminar Halls for effective academic usage are booked through intranet using faculty login ID. Registers are maintained for the purpose of recording complaints regarding non-functional facilities, requests for Computer/ Network support, plumbing and carpentry work. The complaints are attended to by the concerned personnel/technician. The Information resource Centre with an impressive collection of books, online Journals and Scientific periodicals of International repute is completely automated and the routine activities are managed by the Librarians of both the shifts with the help of library support staffs. The users must obtain the log-in credentials from the Librarian to access e-resources databases/sites. Library software is used for the stock verification and the report of the lost books are prepared and submitted during the Library Executive Committee Meeting. The Physical Education department headed by the Physical Directors of both the shifts are responsible for managing the sports field, sports complexes and gymnasium. The outdoor play area for sports is maintained by clearing the grass regularly and by levelling the play area to avoid injury while playing. The flooring in the indoor sports training centre is made of a slip free material. Periodic checking and service is done for the wear and tear of the gym equipment and players/users are instructed to wear shoes while doing any activity/workout in the play area/gym. Instructions to the users are displayed in the gymnasium with regard to the usage of various equipment in the gym.

5.3.2 – Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words)

The elected body of the college- The Student Senate, comprising of about 27 students from both Shifts 1 Shift 2 play an active role in the governance of the student body and serves as a liaison between the management and the student community on campus. They maintain discipline on campus and take an active role

in keeping the campus clean. The senate members along with other student representatives spear head student participation in various cultural and co-curricular activities. The students exercise their leadership skills and serve on various committees such as canteen committee, Alumni, hostel, sports, and cultural. Student Senate along with the Dean of Student services organize the Assembly hour program, white gift ceremony, Students' induction program and other campus activities. Creating awareness on companies for recruitment on campus, interacting with the alumnae to organize Annual Food Fair, Encouraging students to participate and promoting the functions of various clubs are also the role of the college senate. They bring student concerns, initiatives, and ideas to discuss with the Principal, Bursar, Dean of Students services and the IQAC coordinator. The intercollegiate cultural event "Festive" is managed by the student body. It is conceived, planned, organized and conducted by the student senate with support from a large team of student volunteers. They spear head the entire two day event which has good participation from students of various other colleges. Women's Christian College effectively facilitates decentralization and participative management in almost all academic and administrative functions of the college to maximize work efficiency. The strength of the institution is the involvement of the management, faculty, and students in taking collective decisions, planning, and implementing an action plan for the successful conduct of major events on campus. A significant aspect of this during the academic year is the initiation of the new administrative Human Resource Office which is headed by the Human Resource Officer supported by the Maintenance Manager. The Officer works in collaboration with the Principal, Bursar, faculty, support staff and is responsible for the maintenance of infrastructure, facilities, and amenities on campus, ensuring security in campus and further plays a major role in the recruitment of non-teaching and maintenance staff. The process of curriculum planning and development is coordinated by a Curriculum Planning and Development Committee comprising the Principal, Dean of Academic Affairs, IQAC Coordinator, and faculty representatives from all departments. The committee issues guidelines/templates to Departments for periodic curriculum design and revision based on University of Madras guidelines. During this year the departments had autonomy in formulating PSOs and planning their curriculum based on LOCF. The course teachers have the autonomy to diversify assessment and evaluation patterns for the courses taught by them. Faculty representatives and even members of the alumnae in committees and bodies like the Governing Body, Executive Board, Academic Council, Admission Committee, Curriculum Development Committee, Research Advisory Committee, Institutional Ethics Committee is actively involved in planning, decision making, and implementation of various programs in coordination with the Principal, Bursar and the Deans of various centres/services.

Strategy Type	Details
Admission of Students	The admission process is streamlined through the integration of online admission system with the institutional ERP system to make the process more efficient and user friendly in terms of providing faster, transparent service and efficient maintenance of records. This system facilitates generation of complete list of applicants, merit list, selected list and web notice for each program and has facilitated quick generation of student ID cards, demographic details required for reports and queries. Updating of

student information is reflected across the various functional departments of the institution thereby ensuring accuracy of the database. Department Faculty representatives headed by the Admission Officers handle PR queries. The Scrutiny committee comprising of senior faculty from various disciplines ensured that admissions follow government regulations and rules pertaining to reservation.

Examination and Evaluation

Academic performance of students is assessed throughout the semester through a system of Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) which is based on two tests and Seminars/Assignments for each course. Students are expected to take both the tests. Retests are conducted only for authorized participation in sports. Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and End Semester Examination are given equal weightage while computing the aggregate marks. During this year, more examination and assessment processes have been computerized and the modules added to the existing ERP to make the system more efficient. The Chief Superintendents can identify the allotment of invigilation dates to the faculty with ease when the dates of valuation are entered in the system.

Teaching and Learning

To enhance the methods of teaching, learning and evaluation processes to cater to the needs of the rapid changes in the modern world, some of the initiatives taken are : ? Faculty Development programs have been conducted on the usage of Google forms for on-line assessments. ? Student Feedback has been received and analyzed at the end of each semester through a structured online course and teacher evaluation form. ? Encouraged E-learning through MOOC Swayam On-Line platform by organizing awareness campaign about the courses and certification offered by the portal after which many students and faculty registered for various courses. For Certificate courses offered from July to October 2019 and January to April, 2020 by NPTEL, the number of students and faculty from various departments who underwent the courses were 2743. ? Innovative teaching methodologies including student centric methods adopted by the teaching faculty. ? The

institution has become the member of National Digital Library of India, a project under Ministry of Education, Government of India and hence, on-line Education materials are made available to all the students and faculty. ? Using Open-Source Software for developing projects.

Curriculum Development

Curriculum development focuses on achieving optimal student wholesome development and student learning outcomes. ? An FDP on "Outcome Based Education" was conducted to create awareness among teaching faculty about Learning Outcome based Curriculum Framework. Program Outcomes(POs), Program Specific Outcomes(PSOs) and Course Outcomes(COs) for all programmes offered in Semester I and II for 2020-21 batch have been stated and mapping of courses with POs and PSOs have been completed in this initial phase of implementation. Curriculum have been revised to meet the Program Objectives. ? MOOC components have been embedded in our curriculum. ? To enhance the skills of the students, 18 Value added Certificate courses have been offered by the various departments. ? Two new programmes have been introduced: 1) MA International Studies 2) Ph.D in Computer Science. ? Conducted Academic Audit to evaluate quality processes on various parameters. ? Curriculum Planning and Development meetings are conveyed by the Deans of Academics on regular basis to discuss about academic and curriculum initiatives.

Research and Development

Research and Development activities of the institution are: ? A FDP Workshop on 'Bibliometrics, Ethics and Anti-plagiarism Tools in Research' was organized to facilitate faculty research and publication. ? Two faculty members from the Department of Home Science received a grant of US\$ 4,560 for a project from United Board for Christian Higher Education in Asia (UBCHEA). ? Two faculties from the PG Research Department of Biotechnology has applied for two patents. ? One faculty from the Department of English received copyright certificate as author for literary/dramatic work. ? Six faculty and one student received the Doctoral degrees ? One student from

the PG Research Department of Biotechnology received a grant of Rs. 7500/- from Tamil Nadu State Council for Science and Technology for carrying out her final semester project and another student from the same department was awarded the CSIR - Senior Research Fellowship to pursue her research work. ? Thirty five students and two faculty members received research seed grants and completed their project work successfully.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

There has been significant enhancement in the functioning of Information Resource Centre using the latest technology and more infrastructure facilities have been added. ? An Orientation program to create awareness towards the availability of various print and online resources, facilities and services of the IRC was conducted. ? Gate Entry Monitoring System facility to update the users' access with their college ID card which is integrated with the Library Management System. This function further supports in tracking the usage pattern. ? Transactions of library books are done using the barcode/RFID enabled features. The antitheft RFID gate system is a boon to the library's infrastructure. All the library books added to the collection are tagged with the RFID lables. ? Video screening facility in the digital library room are available for accessing e-resources like online databases, DVDs/CDs ? Urkund Anti-plagiarism tool for screening the publications of the faculty and students. ? Enrolment of Institutional member of Anna University library for rendering resource sharing support to the students and faculty members especially for accessing e-resources like ACM, IEEE etc., Infrastructure and facilities added: ? Restrooms for students near the Science and Mason blocks ? Indoor Sports Facility ? Rain water harvesting ? Enhanced recreational and Wi-Fi facilities in the hostels. ? Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The Innovation and Incubation Cell (IIC) is paving the way for linkages with the industry to support student innovations through mentoring and guidance in innovations and patenting. The industry experts and representatives on various committees like the IQAC, academic council and boards of studies offer valuable inputs for enhancing the employability and overall development of students. The Linkages/Collaborations forged by the Career guidance Cell with industry partners had resulted in several soft skill training, aptitude and logical reasoning training sessions, leadership and communication skills workshop and placements for our students. "The Rise", a global network of Tamil Entrepreneurs and Professionals was organized. The Departments have collaborations with more than fifteen companies/organizations to promote Curriculum development, Student Internship, On-the-job training, Faculty Development, Consultancy, guest lectures , Student placement etc. Some of them include eNTrust Pvt Ltd, Tata Consultancy Services, Cognizant Technology Solutions, Princeton Academy, Tamil Nadu Science and Technology Centre, Chennai, Floranix, Sansbound Networking Company.

Human Resource Management

The Institution has adopted and practicing the concept of optimum utilization of resources. The administration and maintenance of campus has been broadly classified into six systems with identified leaders to support and ease the process of maintenance and enhance the overall quality. Management methodologies such as work prioritization are adopted to emphasize on accountability and improve the quality of work procedures thereby reducing the delay of result. The HR Office has been involving everyone by enhancing their skills through skill development programmes which aids in reduction of cost, time and wastage of materials and machines.

The college employs two auditing firms to look after Internal and Statutory audits every year. The Executive Board of the college appoints the internal auditor who checks every bill/voucher of each account for the financial year and presents his comments and suggestions to the audit committee of the college. The audit committee seeks clarifications and provides suggestions to the Bursar and the team at the bursar's office. In addition to the internal auditor, the statutory auditor is appointed by the college association. At the end of the financial year, the statutory auditor audits every account, also taking note of the comments of the internal auditor. Apart from this, mandatory State and Central Government Audit scrutinize the grants received from government agencies and their expenditure. There have been no major audit objections. Minor errors of omission and commission pointed out by auditors have been corrected and efforts are taken to avoid recurrence.

BEST PRACTICE 1 Title: Integration of online admission process with institutional ERP system. The objectives of this practice are to • Make the admission process more efficient and user-friendly in terms of providing faster, transparent service and efficient maintenance of records. • To reduce manpower requirements thereby ensuring confidentiality objectivity. • To facilitate applicants from across India and abroad. • To facilitate quick retrieval of student details. The process of generating admission notices, sending emails and SMS to the selected candidates is entirely automated and the selected candidate is permitted to download the admission notice and produce it to complete the admission process on campus. The admission process is complete once the necessary documents are verified, the student photograph is taken and fee payment is made. Since the online admission system has been designed to integrate with the ERP system of the institution, the admitted student details can be accessed directly by the administrative academic departments of the institution.

BEST PRACTICE 2 Title of the Practice: Establishment of a Community Garden on campus. The objectives of this Practice are to encourage organic gardening as well as to highlight the importance of healthy and sustainable food production and consumption habits among the student community. A sense of community is developed among the students and knowledge sharing takes place between students as they become involved not just in their own crops but also in those of their friends. An area of 29 x 18m was identified on campus and each student interested in this project was allotted a plot based on the lot taken by her. The allotted strip of land was to remain with the student for a specific period of time, a year. Thirty three students participated in the first year of this project, with some choosing to work independently and others in small groups. Students are given the liberty to choose the crop of their choice, ranging from ornamental flowers to vegetables. The harvested produce is sold on campus. Students work on their garden spaces after classes every day, and are responsible for every stage of the process, from the beginning with the preparation of soil, to sowing, and later on, weeding, and other tasks related to maintenance including manuring. Only organic manure is used and organic pest control methods are employed by students. This form of experiential learning takes place with occasional guidance from faculty members, whenever needed.

7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 – Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

Women's Christian College has been striving hard and doing its best to keep up the vision in mind to offer wholesome and holistic education to the students and has never compromised the high standard it has set for itself. The institution believes in helping our students become global citizens with a wide range of employability skills to help them succeed in the international arena. To support our students in gaining these invaluable skills we offer a wide range of study abroad opportunities to students at their UG level. One such opportunity is the semester abroad program at Letourneau University, Texas, US, and Liverpool Hope University, UK. II-year UG students are eligible to register for these programs. Ten students were selected for the semester abroad program at Letourneau University between 2019 and 2020. Two students were selected for a semester abroad Program at Liverpool Hope University between 2019 and 2020.

WCC also has an MOU with Concordia College, New York for an American Transfer Program. This is a 21 program where a student will finish 2 years of study in WCC and then proceed to Concordia to do two additional semesters and earn an American Degree. To enable students to experience life and learning outside India WCC has also partnered with Binary University, Malaysia to offer short-term summer programs. The institution had carried out a number of initiatives to integrate technology into education by the usage of ICT to aim for higher learning outcomes. The students were also encouraged to enroll in online education through e-learning platforms. Need-based Faculty Development programs were conducted on the usage of Google forms to create quizzes, assessments, etc., and Google Classroom to streamline the process of sharing information between the teachers and the students. This has enabled the faculty to have a smooth transition from Offline to Online for teaching-learning and assessment processes. Awareness Campaigns were organized for the students and the faculty to encourage e-learning from the SWAYAM e-learning platform, and the outcome was evident from the significant rise in the enrolments of students and faculty for various courses and the merit certifications obtained by many of our students. All the teaching faculty members were encouraged to register as members of the National Digital Library of India, a digital repository of learning resources containing textbooks, articles, videos, audiobooks, lectures, simulations, fiction, and all other kinds of learning media.
